





Chair's Welcome



Outgoing Chair—Mabel Currie



2019 proved to be an incredibly busy and fruitful year for Y2K since multi-year funding was secured for all three of our main work streams. Ongoing commitment from Children in Need helped us inspire the confidence of other major funders including National Lottery Com-



Our work in schools was popular as ever, extending from the long-standing relationship with Newbattle Community High School (NCHS) to us delivering groupwork and 1:1 supports to pupils from St. David's, Lasswade and Beeslack High Schools through our **Y2K+** and **180** services.

Our *Summer Programme* benefitted greatly from the addition of a new *Y2Kitchen* initiative devised by the young people to address the issue of holiday hunger. Staff supported Youth Reps to build relationships with local supermarkets, shops, and businesses to attract donations of fresh fruit and veg as well as 'store cupboard' staples. We were able to provide 248 meals over the 6week period, in a non-stigmatising way thanks to Y2K's opendoor, no cost/low-cost ethos. Fantastic support from community stakeholders has helped us make lasting relationships for ongoing work.

Another great success was the *Mayfield Explorers* project which Y2K delivered in partnership with the National Mining Museum Scotland. The young explorers were able to celebrate the year end with an exhibition at the NMMS and the installation of a 'living museum' of their very own in the form of a wonderful indoor mural at Y2K.



On 12th March, at what turned out to be one of the last big celebration events before lockdown – Y2K was proud runner up at the *Youthlink Scotland National Youth Work Awards 2020* in two categories – *Youth Worker of the Year'* and *Youth Justice and Prevention'*.

Since the suspension of face-to-face services, due to social distancing restrictions, all our staff have been home-based, but work has not ceased. Y2K has continued to provide online support to our young people via social media platforms. We have fundraised for technology to support the Y2K infrastructure so that we can respond flexibly to changing needs. As we have carefully followed the Scottish Govt's route map through and out of lockdown we continue to offer a menu of options including digital supports, face-to-face small groupwork and 1:1 activities based at Y2K or within school as appropriate. We are also piloting some new outreach work for youths within the local community. Whatever lies ahead there will need to be a good degree of flexibility to allow us to respond to a changing landscape while continuing to offer safe, high quality supports. We must support our young people to re-socialise safely and to ensure they are supported in the losses they have experienced during the pandemic.

As outgoing Chair, and after many years of service on the Y2K Board, I have to say how very proud I am to have been associated with this fantastic community youth service. I will continue to be a member supporter of Y2K and I am confident that the incoming Chair, Susan, will enjoy the same backing and commitment from community partners and stakeholders.

Special thanks must go to all those who have contributed to our work over the past 12months, especially the staff, volunteers, young people, and board members.
